Latter Days of Pentecost Season

Dear Friends at St. John's,

While it would be attractively comforting to think of our parish church as a refuge from the outside world, it would be a mistake. We would, I think, be mistaken if we thought that when those big red doors were closed behind us on Sunday morning we were somehow, with a sigh of relief, shutting out the random craziness of the world. Yes, everyone is entitled to a bit of respite once in a while, but even Jesus found it unrealistic to discover a place where he could be alone and insulated; the crowds sought him out, and the authorities haunted him. His mission was rather to be engaged with the people, to walk the dusty roads with them, to gather with them, to share their needs in each village and community. As his 'Body' in our own generation, it is our mission, too.

Your Vestry and I have begun an initiative to help us engage with our community, and I'd like to share its particulars. It is being called "Oneida Listens." For some months now, a planning committee from the parish has discussed just how we might do a better job of connecting with the greater Oneida community, recognizing all our neighbors no matter what their differences might be. As much as Jesus might have been told that his mission should only be to people of a certain background, God's Spirit led him to all others, despite their language, tribe, or nation. Our initiative is meant to involve all aspects and people in our community. It is not evangelizing. It is not proselytizing. It is not trying to 'fix' any specific problem. It is an opportunity to build trust and to love our neighbors as ourselves. It is, in a sense, setting a table to which all are invited and encouraged to bring their own personalities and stories.

At this table, the hope is for common reconciliation and refreshment. The vision is for a healthier and happier community. The end-game is inclusion. And it begins with dialogue. So, here is the plan: We have designed a dialogue series on seven Thursday evenings, from Sept. 23 – Nov. 4, at the Oneida Public Library Meeting Room. Participants will share their experiences and their stories of diversity, inclusion, and exclusion in a friendly and welcoming learning environment. Sessions will include structured activities as well as discussion. Experienced facilitators Darline and Jeremy Wattles have participated in and led dialogue groups in other Upstate NY communities as well as in higher education since 2015. This initial offering includes a group of 25 participants, and as the program is tweaked and adapted, we hope to offer it again (and again) to any who are interested. Participants from St. John's this time include myself, Gale, Jeremy and Darline, Gloria Wilkins, Ann Hodgins, Peter Slaunwhite, Marty Walrath, Birdy Burdick, and friends of the parish Charles and Malinda Abraham.

While this initiative began with our vestry, we are not treating it as a 'church function', but rather as a community activity. St. John's has, I think, been called to convene this activity, seeing a need and finding a way to address it. I hope you will be intrigued enough to participate in subsequent meetings, and, meanwhile, that you will pray earnestly for this autumn's group. Pray for God's blessing on our initiative and for Christ's work of reconciliation in our community.

God Comes to Women

Have you ever noticed how in the scriptures men are always going up into the mountains to commune with the Lord?

God comes to them as they sit beside sickbeds, as they give birth, care for the elderly, and perform necessary mourning and burial rites.


Even at the empty tomb, Mary was the first to witness Christ's resurrection, She was there because she was doing the womanly chore of properly preparing Christ's body for burial.

God knows where we are and the burdens we carry. God sees us, and if we open our eyes and our hearts we will see God, even in the most ordinary places and in the most ordinary things.
