

The new structure is by the main entrance to ECF near their parking area. We will continue to meet at 3:00pm on Thursdays thru December except last two weeks being Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve. On those two weeks we will meet on Wednesday, December 23 & 30, also @ 3:00. No need to make reservations, just show up and well fit you in.
