GOD IS REAL.

But, while God's reality may seem credible to many of us, we are becoming a minority. Recent polling reveals that fewer than 50% of Americans 'believe' in God. And that startling number includes all religious faiths, Christian, Muslim, Jewish, Hindu, etc. Many of us feel 'attached' to God in our hearts and minds and souls, but the majority apparently do not. One wonders, then, what becomes of life's goodness. In what do others place their faith? From where do they derive their hope? What could possibly be their model of righteousness, their motive for justice? When God goes unknown, I fear for the state of our right relationships.

The Bible scriptures provide compelling examples of God's desire for covenant relationship with us, but arguably the most relevant 'scriptures' are written on our hearts. God promises to love us, and to lovingly give us freedom, opportunity, wholeness, restoration, mercy, encouragement, eternal significance, wisdom, and all manner of good will, with the hope that we will thrive. God is like a reliable parent. God chooses us for adoption. And God wishes that we will crave that embrace. Many have benefited from experiencing these truths.

The brief earthly lifetime of Jesus, God's anointed emissary to humankind, was not a 'oneand-done'. This is the Easter message. Since the beginning, God's Christ has been active among us as teacher, companion, confidant, champion, and model. Listening with the ear of their hearts, many have heard him say "You are not alone, for I am with you." And his advice has been priceless for many as well. He bids all to join him in rising from deathly conditions, leaving useless and empty tombs behind. He bids us follow his enlightened path.

That breath of fresh air which many have enjoyed comes from God's own 'lungs'. It is the inhalation of creativity, inspiration, and love, which bring renewal to life itself. As mysterious as all this is, it is yet not a secret. It has been shared and cherished by many. It is the deep delight of many. But many, many more should be invited to experience this faith. Let it be our mission this Eastertide to see that it happens.



Church is a family. A family coming together, setting aside differences, forgetting past mistakes, rejoicing in the smallest of victories.


Church, the body, and the circle of sinners-turned-saints, is where He resides, and if we ask, He is faithful to come.
