

# Evangelist Lent 2021

Roughly translated from ancient Greek, the word Liturgy means "the work of the people". Our church practices are organized into various liturgies, or "works", for various occasions and purposes. For those of us in the Episcopal Church USA, our liturgies are expressed, in handy detail, in the Book of Common Prayer. In its pages, we can find liturgies for Sunday worship, for Baptisms, for Marriages, for Funerals, for Daily Prayers, and for special occasions. And for each, there is an understanding of the "work" the people ought to share. In Baptism, for example, the work we do focuses on how we can respond to the covenant God offers us; how we can shape our lives, and the lives of our children, around the teachings and the grace of God in Christ. Marriages have a work, too, of course; a work of relationship-building which respects the individual while creating a specific team, a holy bond, to do the work of God together. At funerals, our work, expressed by the BCP liturgy, is to commend the departed to God and attend to those who mourn. As a parish family, we are called to do these works together, just as we are called to the work of the Sunday worship liturgy.

We are entering a new liturgical season of the church, marked by the special occasion of Ash Wednesday. It is called Lent. You may not see dramatic changes in our various liturgies, but our work takes on a different sort of attitude during Lent. Yes, for the six weeks of Lent we will delete the word 'Alleluia' from our worship script, and our physical 'backgrounds' will be less ornamental, but the important work to which Lent is calling us is a change of heart. During Epiphany, the liturgical season which we are now completing, the attitude which our readings and practices encourage is one of awe. We are awed at the revelation of God's love, at the unveiling of the meaning of Christ's presence among us, at Christ's authority over the powers of this world, and at the light of Christ to guide us and warm our hearts. We have been unwrapping a remarkable gift. Lent causes us to wonder, though, if we truly deserve this gift. Was it really meant for us? Was it really meant for me? Are we actually worthy to receive such an awesome offering? And yet, even as we are pondering these questions, God goes on giving the gift to us anyway.

Lent is often compared to looking in a mirror. As we see our reflections, we are called to be brutally honest. Do we like what we see? Are there changes we can make to the identity we display to the world? Accept, for a moment, those things which cannot be changed, and remember that we are made in God's own image, made to be lovable even with our warts and wrinkles. But, think about how we project ourselves to our neighbors: do we really reflect how loving and loveable we are meant to be? Can we lament our errors and mistakes, while simultaneously rejoicing in the life and opportunities God has created for us? Frankly, yes. That, to me, is the Lenten message. It helps me specify the work I need to do, and the liturgy which should guide my course. Metaphorically, I should perhaps brush my wayward hair, put on a clean shirt, adjust my suspenders, and generally make myself more presentable. I should rejoice in what God has given me, including the Light of Christ, and then clean it all up so others can see God's glory reflected in me. Lament need not mean hopelessness. The past need not predict the future. Metaphoric cleanliness is next to, but not equal to Godliness.

Will we ever succeed in making ourselves perfectly deserving of God's remarkable gifts? Frankly, no. But God continues to give the gifts, the blessings, anyway. Count on it. Just the same, the liturgy of Lent expresses our intent to improve, to wash away the dirt and brush off the dust and continue the work of becoming more like what God is dreaming of. We should do it for ourselves, we should do it for our neighbors, and we should do it out of devotion to God's dream. And, thankfully, we can do it together as a church family; we can support and encourage one another in this spiritual fellowship. I invite you, therefore, to join us in a the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination in that metaphoric mirror, by repentance to turn things around and clean them up, by prayer to join in God's dream, and by gathering with us to hear and meditate on God's holy Word. Though it begins with the pronouncement that we are but dust, and ends with the startling event of the crucifixion, Lent need not be a time of darkness and despair. The Light of Christ shines in the darkness, and the darkness cannot overcome it, and hope for a better world and our better selves drives our liturgical work this season. May God bless our labors. #### Finance Report & Investments

Women of St. John's and Quilt Guild accounts closed and moved to separate lines within General Fund. The Vestry will be transferring Memorial and Building Maintenance Funds to investments.

Fund raising- \$400 from Pancake Supper, but other fundraising dinners and auctions had to be cancelled Windows/Property Pledges/Donations received to date- \$16,114.

Generous end of year donations which helped offset the lack of opportunity to hold various fund raisers.

Utilities down, due to church services remaining remote

Building maintenance/repair-\$7000= roof repairs and organ maintenance

#### Investments: Account Review presented by Brad Adams

- \*Balanced Approach + there are 7 different accounts in stocks/bonds (mutual funds)-moderate risk return
- \*Up 11.36% compared to 11.03% which was the "Return Benchmark"
- \*Money can be deposited and withdrawn from the investments without penalty.

St. John's Episcopal Church Website- Gloria Wilkins walked us through the new website, which was built with the guidance and effort of Shane Rand, Father Nick's future son-in-law. As Webmaster, Gloria updates and posts these various communications Upcoming Special Services with live links posted, Weekly sermons, Monthly Evangelists, Monthly Calendars. Special Features: Prayer Requests and "Donate button" Quilters- Beth Wieland- Mission- reach out to community who are struggling in any manner.



Cheers to proclaiming the News from God.




